Prior to the Procedure please be aware of the following:

- 1. If you are ill or have a high temperature the day before the procedure please call the office.
- 2. Do not eat or drink anything four hours before the procedure.
- 3. If you take "heart" or "blood pressure" medicines, you should take these as early as possible that morning, with a sip of water, only. And, <u>DO NOT</u> take diabetic medications the morning of your procedure unless otherwise instructed.

Day Of Procedure:

- 1. On the morning of your procedure, prior to your arrival, please:
 - a. Administer a fleet's enema as directed (You will get this from the drugstore)
 - b. Bring all of your medications with you.
- 2. Dress casually. Choose clothing that will not be tight, and wear under shorts not boxers.
- 3. Plan on being in the office for 2 hours. The procedure takes about 60 minutes to do and after you are alert you will be released to go home.
- 4. When you are discharged, someone who can drive you home and remain with you for 24 hours must accompany you.

What To Expect During The Treatment

- *The treatment itself generally takes 60 minutes although you should allow 2 hours for the entire visit.
- *You will be positioned on a treatment bed in a comfortable position.
- *A flexible catheter will be inserted into your bladder to drain the bladder. An anesthetic solution will be injected into the bladder to decrease discomfort and bladder spasms.
- *The flexible treatment catheter will then be inserted; the treatment catheter balloon will then be inflated in the bladder. This keeps the catheter position in the correct area of the prostate to be treated.
- * A temperature sensor will be then inserted into the rectum to monitor rectal temperatures during the procedure.
- *During the procedure you may experience the following:
 - -Bladder Spasms
 - -The urge to urinate
 - -The sensation of needing to have a bowel movement
 - A warm or burning sensation in the abdomen
 - A burning sensation at the end of the penis
 - Pressure in the rectum

What To Expect After The Treatment

- *The tissue surrounding the urethra may be irritated after the procedure. You may go home with a urinary catheter in place and connected to a drainage bag. This allows urine to drain from the bladder while the swelling and inflammation subsides.
- *Generally, the catheter is in place for 2-7 days, depending on your physicians order.
- *You may notice a small amount of blood in your urine- this is normal. If the bleeding seems excessive, you should call your physician.
- *You should drink plenty of fluids: drink at least a glass of liquid (water) every 2 hours during the waking hours while the catheter is in place.
- *You may pass urine around the catheter instead of through it; this may be accompanied by an intense urge to urinate. (Bladder Spasms)
- *Avoid lifting objects heavier than 5 pounds
- *You may shower the day after the procedure; NO TUB baths till the catheter is removed.

Report the following to the physician immediately:

- *Fever greater than 101 degrees
- *Excessive bright red blood in the urine
- *No urinary output in the drainage bag
- *Pain unrelieved by medications.
